JOHN WHISLEY AYRES-ANDREWS

Glyn and Pam MORGAN of Ruislip England were, unquestionably, the primary researchers of this book. They travelled through various villages in Suffolk to provide us with research material, photographs and maps.

Despite being unrelated to our family, Glyn and Pam undertook a project that was far too large for anyone else. They began searching public records to link our Australian ancestor with his family in Suffolk, and the only honest clue they had was "Ann Fenn" as the name of his mother. This was information was found on his Death Certificate and was supplied by his Australian wife.

The first joyous results came when Glyn and Pam revealed that the said, "Ann Fenn", had married John Whisley AYRES and their first child was named for his father. The junior, John Whisley AYRES, became known as "JWA", because he did not alter his initials when he changed his name to ANDREWS.

Nola MACKEY, who has a Research Centre near Grafton, found the Depositors Journal Index together with relevant Shipping Records, wherein JWA's Australian wife had been the Sponsor of his two youngest English children. It was the first chance to reunite in Australia as a family. This left a mystery as to the life of JWA's remaining child, Emily Morris Ayres. After thirty-five years of research, a descendant was found in 2010.

Wayne FRANKS of La Salle Canada, was the last link, as his great grandmother was Emily. She was the oldest Ayres child. My great grandmother, Eleanor Jane, was the oldest Andrews child. Both sisters died in the year 1907, in their respective countries of England and Australia. It was Emily's daughter, Mabel (Mrs Franks), who migrated to Canada.

We are left with conjectures amongst older generations that began in 1599, and much needs to be added to recent branches. Any corrections or new data will be gratefully added to this initial draft. J Kepper (compiler)

WIKIPEDIA reports: "The surname of AYRES was an official name 'the heir'. Following the crusades in Europe in the 11th, 12th and 13th centuries, a need was felt for a family name to replace the one given at birth, or in addition to it. This was recognized by those of noble birth and, particularly, by those who went on the Crusades, as it added prestige and practical advantage to their status.

Early records of the name mention Roger de Hayre who was recorded in the County of Norfolk in 1264. Thomas Ayr of Yorkshire was recorded in the Yorkshire Poll Tax of 1379, and Richard Ayre of County Lancashire appears in 1400. Humphrey Mercer married Katherine Ayer in London in the year of 1583. Francis Lee married Ann Ayre at St. George's, Hanover Square, London in 1757.

Between the 11th and 15th centuries it became customary for surnames to be assumed in Europe, but they were not commonplace in England or Scotland before the Norman Conquest of 1066. Those of gentler blood assumed surnames at this time, but it was not until the reign of Edward II (1307-1377) that it became a common practice for all people. The associated arms are recorded in Sir Bernard Burkes General Armoury.


Many factors contributed to the establishment of a surname system. For generations after the Norman Conquest of 1066 a very few dynasts and magnates passed on hereditary surnames, but the main of the population, with a wide choice of first-names out of Celtic, Old English, Norman and Latin, avoided ambiguity without the need for a second name.

As society became more stabilized, there was property to leave in wills, the towns and villages grew and the labels that had served to distinguish a handful of folk in a friendly village were not adequate for a teeming slum where perhaps most of the householders were engaged in the same monotonous trade, so not even their occupations could distinguish them, and some first names were gaining a tiresome popularity, especially Thomas after 1170. The hereditary principle in surnames gained currency first in the South, and the poorer folk were slower to apply it. By the 14th century however, most of the population had acquired a second name. One of several families bearing the surname traces its descent from Humphrey le Heyr of Bromham, County Wiltshire, who was one of the crusaders who accompanied Richard I to the Holy Land in the 12th century".







SECKER:

SEAKER - SECKER - SAKER - SACKER. "A maker of sacks or coarse cloth, sackcloth"

FENN:

Initial F in the South of England was pronounced V, which is now, at times, reflected in the spelling. In the earliest documents we find French or Latin forms WALTER EN LA FENNE 1340 Subsidy Rolls Worcestershire (Fenn). "Dweller near")

Surnames worth examining in this connection are those derived from the various words for marshy ground, such as **Fen**, Carr, Marsh, Sloth and Moor.

The word carr or kerr had a precise meaning in Norfolk during the Middle Ages, and later. The *Promptorium Parvulorum*, an English-Latin dictionary compiled c1440, probably at Kings Lynn, defines 'Ker' as 'where trees grow by water or **fen'**, and Forby, writing centuries later, gave the meaning of 'Car' in the East Anglian dialect as 'a wood or grove on moist soil, generally of alders'.

Early Norfolk occurrences of the surname **Fenn** are largely concentrated in the district around the Broads in east Norfolk, with a smaller number in the fens around the Wash in the west.

In the Norfolk subsidy for 1329-39, there are 28 persons called **Fen** (including atte Fen, etc) and of these, 21 are in the Broads area, especially around Wroxham, three are in the west Norfolk Fenland and the remaining four are widely dispersed in other parts of the country. Other early occurrences of the name **Fen**, and of surnames formed from compounds (Overfen, de Westfen, de Blackfen, de Fenrowe, ate Fenhous, etc) show a similar pattern of distribution.

The name **FENN** was also common in **SUFFOLK**. Twenty-five persons of the name occur in the Suffolk 1327 subsidy rolls, and are rather widely distributed. Nine are in the extreme north-east of the country, where there are marshes along the rivers Yare and Waveney, 12 are dispersed in central Suffolk, and three others are in the coastal areas of the south east.

The name is absent in this subsidy from the Fens in the extreme north west of the country, the Breckland area in north-west Suffolk, and from the south west of the county.

If the distribution of the name **Fenn** in 1327 is compared with the distribution of the same surname in the Suffolk returns for the subsidy granted in 1523, it can be seen that by the 16th century the situation had largely changed, and that by the later date the name was widely distributed over most of Suffolk, though still noticeably absent from the north-west of the county.

In certain early 16th Century sources for Norfolk, the surname was fairly widespread in the east of the county, though it was still more common in the Broads district than anywhere else; in the Fenlands around the West the name was rare.


Of the other toponymics derived from terms for marshy ground, the surname Marsh was much less common in medieval Norfolk or Suffolk than were Carr and Fen.

ST MARY'S ANGLICAN CHURCH, HADLEIGH, SUFFOLK

"The Parish Church in which Seckers, Fenns and Ayers were married and all their children baptised.

Two generations of Fenns are listed in early transcripts of this medieval burial ground"

HADLEIGH "is 64 miles from London, in the Hundred and Union of **Cosford**, rural deanery and archdeaconry of **Cosford** and Diocese of **Ely**. Hadleigh owes its wealth of timber framed buildings to its importance in the wool trade during the 14-16 centuries. During this period the parish church, Saint Mary's, was enlarged and the spire, which dominates the town, was added. The deanery tower was built by Archdeacon William Pykenham and completed in 1495."

Glen wrote, "I am enclosing some photos of the interior of St Mary's Church of England, Hadleigh. So try to picture your folk getting married at the altar, also the service around the font at the back of the church for the baptism of the children. Hadleigh people have been baptised in the font (which is large enough to immerse a baby) ever since 1350."

"The church itself is medieval, dating back to the 15th century. The church tower was begun about 1190. The roof was raised about 1450 and windows of an earlier style re-used in the clerestory to let in more light".

Glyn looked for relevant head-stones, but had to report, "The tombstones were the most unreadable that I have ever come across - there was hardly one of them that I could decipher. It came about from the type of stone used, which seemed to attract a sort of lichen growth which obliterated the writing."

Fortunately, all headstone of the time were transcribed in 1893 and 1920, showing that two generations of Fenns were interred in the church yard. See photos elsewhere.






VISITORS: WELCOME TO OUR CHURCH OF ST MARY, HADLEIGH

"No matter from which direction you enter Hadleigh, there is one feature that dominates the skyline - St Mary's church. Its elegance fascinated Sudbury artist, Thomas Gainsborough (see postcard elsewhere) and forms a site of one of the finest Medieval squares to be seen. The top of the spire of Saint Mary's Church reaches 135 feet.

Today we see the church little changed from its alterations into the Perpendicular style of the 15th Century, but between it and the Guildhall, the foundations of a church of the Saxon period have been found and a church in Hadleigh is recorded in the Domesday Book. In fact three churches have stood on the present site since the 12th Century and there are examples of a 'decorated' style of the 14th Century throughout the St Mary's Church of today. The Church is built of flint and stone said to have been brought from Normandy. It is a living building, with the marks of centuries of development, from the tower (commenced about 1190) to the nave altar of the Holy Trinity (1971).

Hadleigh people have been baptised in the font ever since 1350, and it is large enough to immerse a baby. The cover, which completes it so well, was made in 1925. As you stand near the font, let your eyes take in the great size and wonderful proportions of the building. The roof was raised about 1450 and windows of an earlier style re-used in the clerestory to let in more light. In the 15th and 16th Centuries there was a rood screen at the Chancel Arch. of which only the smaller side sections remain. The 15th Century chancel roof has some ingenious carvings.

On the left or north side is the Lady Chapel. Here is the organ which has been enlarged and improved many times since it was brought

privately to be placed in a gallery at the west end in 1738.

On the eastern side hanging over the clock face is the Angelus Bell on which the hours are struck.

It is said to be 600 years old, judging from the Lombardic characters of legend and, therefore, one of the oldest bells in the country.


As you go out you will see two other medieval buildings beside the church. All have looked much the same for 500 years, and all are still used for their original purposes.

The Guildhall caters for gatherings, and the Deanery Tower as a private dwelling, and the church for worship.

The town has many old buildings; their date often indicating not their origin, but a major restoration.

"No matter from which direction you enter Hadleigh, there is one feature that dominates the skyline - St Mary's. Its elegance fascinated Sudbury artist, Thomas Gainsborough (see postcard elsewhere) and forms a site of one of the finest Medieval squares to be seen. The top of the spire of Saint Mary's Church reaches 135 feet.

Today we see the church little changed from its alterations into the Perpendicular style of the 15th Century, but between it and the Guildhall, the foundations of a church of the Saxon period have been found and a church in Hadleigh is recorded in the Domesday Book. In fact three churches have stood on the present site since the 12th Century and there are examples of a 'decorated' style of the 14th Century throughout the St Mary's of today. St Mary's is built of flint and stone said to have been brought from Normanby. It is a living building, with the marks of centuries of development, from the tower (commenced about 1190) to the nave altar of the Holy Trinity (1971).

Hadleigh people have been baptised in the font ever since 1350, and it is large enough to immerse a baby. The cover, which completes it so well, was made in 1925. As you stand near the font, let your eyes take in the great size and wonderful proportions of the building. The roof was raised about 1450 and windows of an earlier style re-used in the clerestory to let in more light. In the 15th and 16th Centuries there was a rood screen at the Chancel Arch. of which only the smaller side sections remain. The 15th Century chancel roof has some ingenious carvings.

On the left or north side is the Lady Chapel. Here is the organ which has been enlarged and improved many times since it was brought

privately to be placed in a gallery at the west end in 1738.


On the eastern side hanging over the clock face is the Angelus Bell on which the hours are struck.

It is said to be 600 years old, judging from the Lombardic characters of legend and, therefore, one of the oldest bells in the country.

As you go out you will see two other medieval buildings beside the church. All have looked much the same for 500 years, and all are still used for their original purposes. The Guildhall caters for gatherings, and the Deanery Tower as a private dwelling, and the church for worship.

The town has many old buildings; their date often indicating not their origin, but a major restoration.




POST OFFICE DIRECTORY OF 1869 - HADLEIGH CHURCH REFERENCES

"The **Church of St Mary** is ancient and handsome, and is 143 feet long and 63 feet wide, with a high tower and spire containing 8 bells; the exterior was restored in 1854-55, at the cost of about £1,100; and in the year 1859 the spacious graveyard was enclosed at considerable expense by the parishioners; the chancel has been renovated and benched by the Rector, at his own expense, and it is now in contemplation to renovate the whole interior to accord with the improvements effected by the Rector.

Gunthrum, the celebrated Danish sea-king, reigned here for twelve years, and was buried, it is supposed, in the church in 889; since then the structure has been rebuilt on a site closely adjacent to where it formerly stood, and sufficiently near to include the supposed tomb of this monarch; it may be questioned, however, whether this supposition is correct, as the tomb is not older than the fourteenth century; there is also an ancient font, with a curious inscription in Greek, an old pulpit, some old stained glass, a beautiful window, by Hedgland, from a painting by Overbeck, representing Our Saviour Blessing Little Children, in memory of the second wife of the present Rector; also a good organ. The earliest date of the register is November 26th, 1558. The living is a rectory, yearly valued £1,325, in the gift of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and held by the Very Rev, Henry Barry Knox, MA, of Trinity College, Dublin, joint dean of Bocking. The Rectory-house has been much improved; the gateway dates from 1490.

One of the rectors of Hadleigh, Dr Rowland Taylor, was burnt in 1555 on Aldham Common; the place where he suffered is marked with a stone, and in the ancient tower of the Rectory may still be seen the secret room in which he is supposed to have sought refuge from his persecutors. On the way to Coram Street, just outside the town is the **parish cemetery**, which was opened in July 1856."

HADLEIGH OFFICIAL GUIDE OF 1990s

"The Romans lived just outside Hadleigh in the First Century AD and later the place came to prominence as a Saxon settlement. In the 9th Century the Danish Chieftain, Guthrum, was defeated by the Saxons and came to live in Hadleigh. He died here and is believed to have been buried near the site of the parish church.

Flemish weavers who fled from religious persecution in Europe set up a woollen cloth trade in the town and the wealth created enabled the parish church to be rebuilt and enlarged twice by the end of the 15th Century. During this time of prosperity, the Market House was rebuilt and became the Guildhall. The red brick Deanery Tower was built in the churchyard and several charities set up to help the traders.

Hadleigh also became a seat of learning for a time when the University of Cambridge sought refuge during the Plague. During the reign of Queen Mary, Hadleigh's enlightened rector, Rowland Taylor, was arrested and taken to London before being burned at the stake on Aldham Common, just outside Hadleigh.

Hadleigh owes its wealth of timber framed buildings to its importance in the wool trade in the 14th-16th centuries. In the 15th century the wool trade declined as the weavers did not adapt to changing demands for a lighter type of cloth. But the town still grew in population and at the beginning of the 19th century cheap child labour attracted a Colchester firm who set up a silk mill.

The Victorian era brought a New Town Hall, gas lighting and the railway, although passenger services stopped in 1932 and freight in 1965. The line of the old track is now the Railway Walk.

Just as it was the business of wool and grain which gave Hadleigh its prominence and wealth in the past, it is modern day commerce which keeps the town thriving today. Hadleigh is an ancient market town steeped in history and full of atmosphere.


Within the wide High Street is every kind of shop and service expected of a town of the 1990s, but here the appearance of the old and the needs of the new have joined hands to their mutual benefit.

Nestling in the valley of the River Brett lies this ancient market town. An approach to the town centre from the west Bridge Street turns into the wide, distinctive High Street and several fine timbered and Georgian type buildings come into view. If you continue along High Street, the atmosphere of a town retaining its history while meeting the demands of today, is clearly evident.

The town centre lies between two bridges set about one kilometre apart spanning the River Brett as it flows away south. To the west is the Iron Bridge and carrying the road towards Lower Layham is the attractive triple arched Toppesfield Bridge - one of the oldest bridges still in use despite being 'decayed and ready to fall down' in 1591. In the course of time Hadleigh has spread north of the river where the bulk of the residential and industrial development has taken place."




The first village linked to this name is **CREETING ST MARYS**, situated about 7 miles north east of Hadleigh. It was the home parish of **Jane PARKER**, (born c1720) at the time of her marriage on 17 February 1745 at Great Waldingfield, to **John WHISLAY**.

WHISLAY

Whislay (with numerous variations) was a **GREAT WALDINGFIELD** family name and there are many of them registered in that parish over the centuries, and many are buried in the churchyard. We can positively trace our family to a marriage in Great Waldingfield, on 17 February 1745, between **John WHISLAY** (born c1720) and **Jane PARKER**. However, there is an earlier Hadleigh marriage during 1710 to be considered, between **Jacob WHISTLER** and **Elizabeth MILES**.

NUTTON & AYERS

Nutton and Ayers are seen around the areas of **EDWARDSTONE** and **GROTON**, two villages west of Hadleigh. "They are linked not only by their proximity to each other but also by John Winthrop one of the most famous colonisers of North America who became first governor of Massachusetts after quitting Groton as lord of the major to lead the great Puritan emigration in 1630. He founded Boston and was co-founder of Harvard University. Edwardstone Church stands in grounds of a now demolished hall and has some interesting brasses. Much of the 15th Century Groton church is given over to the Winthrop family."

HADLEIGH POST OFFICE DIRECTORY

"HADLEIGH (in 1869) is a parish, market town, head of a county court district, a station on the Eastern Union branch line, and a polling place for the Western division of the county, 64 miles from London, 10½ west from Ipswich station, 7 north-north-east from Nayland, and 11 east from Sudbury by road, hundred and union of Cosford, rural deanery and archdeaconry of Sudbury, and diocese of Ely.

The river Brett, which is not navigable, and which has its rise at Brettenham, winds its course along at the rear of the town and empties its waters into the Stour, near Stratford Street Mary, in this county. The town is lighted with gas, which is supplied by a Company formed in 1861, and has some very good buildings: the chief street is about three quarters of a mile in length. Hadleigh was formerly incorporated, but surrendered its charter in James the Second's time.

There is a Free school, also National schools for boys and infants, and British schools for boys, girls and infants. There are also chapels for Independents, Baptists and Primitive Methodists. The Corn Exchange was built in 1813 by voluntary contributions. A Town Hall was erected in 1851, on the Market Feoffment property, by the trustees; it is a spacious brick building.

A Police Station was built in 1855, at a cost of about £1,100 on a piece of ground formerly occupied by the White Horse Inn. The petty sessions are held here at intervals of three or four weeks, also a county court once in two months at the Town Hall; it includes the following places in its jurisdiction - Aldham, Bildeston, Boxford, Brent Eleigh, Chilsworth, E. Bergholt, Edwardstone, Elmsett, Groton, Hadleigh, Hadleigh Hamlet, Higham, Hitcham, Holton Saint Mary, Kersey, Kettlebaston, Layham, Lindsay, Milden, Monks Eleigh, Naughton, Nedging, Potstead, Raydon, Semer, Shelly, Stratford Saintt Mary, Stoke-by-Nayland, Stoke Leaven Heath, Wattisham, Wenham (Great) and Whatfield. There is a savings bank.

The town was once of eminence in the woollen manufacture and here is a carpet manufactory carried out by Messrs Cooke, Sons and Law, of 12 Friday street, London; and it is now in contemplation to erect a silk manufactory; here are also extensive malthouses, several corn mills, iron foundries, machine works, and a considerable trade in corn is carried on.

The market day is on Monday, when much business is done in corn. Fairs are held on Whit-Monday and Old Michalmas Day and a lamb fair in September. In George Street are almshouses for 32 inmates, chiefly founded by Dr William Pykenham, to which a chapel is attached; there are also almshouses for 8 inmates in Benton street. Besides the almshouses there are others, namely, the Market Feoffment and Ann Beaumont's Charity. The Rev James Cutting Safford and the Rev Robert John Francis are the lords of themanor at Hadleigh Hall and John Frederick Robinson Esq is Lord of the manors of Toppesfield Hall and Cosford Hall. The principal landowners are S C Kersey Esq, W Kersey Esq, the executors of I Strutt, John Cook Esq., the Trustees of the Rev E Jermyn, and the Feoffees of the several local charity estates. The population in 1861 was 3,606, and the area is 4,288 acres. Parish Clerk, Thomas Sexton."


"We thought that Great Waldingfield was a delightful place and so unspoiled with modern development.


Great Waldingfield was very much an Ayers centre and I was interested to see that row of graves of which I took a photo.





KERSEY, SUFFOLK

KERSEY is situated three kilometres north west of JWA's baptismal place of Hadleigh. He always stated that Kersey was his place of birth, but at first, we were quite sceptical. However, it was soon established that he would have been born at the Fenn's *Stonestreet Farm* which is situated much closer to Kersey than it is to Hadleigh.

Promotional brochures promote Kersey as probably one of the best known tourist attractions in Suffolk. "It is set between two hills with the main street fording a river. The atmosphere of a time gone by is the first thing to strike visitors to the village which was one of the centres of the medieval woollen trace, it's name given to the well-known Kerseymere cloth. The area was settled in the 14th Century by Flemish weavers driven out of their own country. It is mentioned in the Domesday Book, but spelt 'Car's eye' meaning a stream running into a brook."

In the photograph of Kersey Village, can be seen the Kersey Inn, which was built in 1435 and named the White Horse.

The foundations were heavy oak baulks laid horizontally along the ground, upon which the structure was erected. In spite of the distorted shape, there is no movement in the building and it requires very little maintenance.



ST MARY'S CHURCH, HADLEIGH

"Painted in 1748 by Thomas Gainsborough at the age of 21, when he was living at Sudbury. Commissioned by Dr Tanner, it hung over the large chimneypiece in his rectory, here seen behind Pykenham's Gateway Tower of c1495.

St Mary's is on the site of a 9th century wooden chapel erected by King Gunthrum. The earliest parts date from the 12th century. In 1555 Dr Roland Taylor, its brave rector, was burned for his faith. The porch with its great sundial and unique 'Cradle' at the base of the spire no longer exists but the 13th century clock and angelus bell are preserved."






BOXFORD VILLAGE

"The narrow streets of this village approximately five kilometres to the south west of Hadleigh, hide fine timber cottages among its array of picturesque old houses.

The church dates back to the 14th Century with a contemporary timber porch.

Inside is a memorial to Elizabeth Hyam who 'was hastened to her end' by a fall at the age of 113!" NB William Whisley Heard married a Constance M Hyem!

A comfortable medieval timber-frame home one room deep offered a heated hall open to the roof bordered by two double-storied, but not necessarily protruding, wings. Roof irregularities may suggest the insertion of a second storey above the hall itself. The upper-floor joists jetty out. The ground-floor room furthest away from the camera might once have been a shop. Its pointed windows, once unglazed, were closed at night by wooden shutters which fell by day to serve as counters. The shape of the remaining apertures as well as the nearer door, the glazing, chimney and protruding staircase tower do not seem medieval, perhaps being alterations of some period after 1560. A steeply sloping roof often indicates an original thatching.

"This is where the AYERS lived, and where JWA's father, **John Whisley AYERS** would have been born in 1780. In 1838 part of it became the Maltings of **George Henry Nutton Ayers** (GHNA). He was still at this address (1861) a year before his death.

From the Boxford Parish Tithe Map, I was able to establish where the 'Nutton' Ayers lived and by luck one of the buildings I photographed in Ellis Street (obtained from the Census Returns) proved to be where Jane WHISLAY and Henry Nutton AYERS lived.







GEORGIAN HOUSE PLAN, 1720


All the children of **Robert FENN** and **Mary ALDRIDGE** grew up on this farm, including JWA's mother, Ann Fenn-Ayers born 1787, and it is where JWA was born. Due to its close proximity to Kersey is the reason he recorded Kersey as his birth place. Glyn wrote, "Being all of brick, I was doubtful at first if the building I was photographing at Stonestreet was really the one from the days of the Fenns. The roof tiles were added within the last five years, and that gave the place a modern look, but the chimneys rather clinch the story, for such a design takes one back into the Georgian period.

When I visited the Public Record Office, I looked at the Title Map for Hadleigh, produced about 1840, and the layout for that particular farmhouse was exactly as I saw it. The Tithe Maps were produced for every parish in the country at a scale of 1: 2400 approximately, so they were capable of showing the shape of all buildings, together with the delineation of the land attached to them. Accompanying the maps were Apportionment Books listing the occupiers of properties, and stating what monetary contribution would be expected from them in future, in place of the payment in kind that had formerly been the custom. Since they arose out of an Act of Parliament, the maps had to be sent to London, and there has been a 100% survival of them - a wonderful genealogical tool."

"Of all the families we are researching in Hadleigh, the Fenns were the most highly placed, with their fairly large farm. Furthermore, other than the sons who were well placed in Agriculture, the rest seem to have taken up a suitable trade, such as Josiah Fenn (born 1788) becoming a Maltster; it was a type of trade in which one was one's own master and owned or ran a business".


No 2 - KERSEY VILLAGE, from Kersey Farm (also near Stonestreet Farm). The view was from Kersey farm looking towards Kersey Church.

No 3 - From the Main Road looking east. On the left hand edge is Kersey Church and on the right, Stonestreet Farm.

Stonestreet Farm remains a place of between 180 and 300 acres which was quite a sizeable farm in that area for those days.

The evidence is that Fenn is not a long-standing name in the area, and that the original bearer of that name most likely came from areas to the west (although John Fenn who married Mary Wellum in 1755, came from Sproughton north east of Hadleigh, he was not born there.)







HADLEIGH ARCHITECTURE

No 1 - "Discovering Your Old House" by David Iredale:

"These terraced cottages are of a type inhabited prosperous by craftsman during the early nineteenth century, provide two main rooms on each floor in double pile style. The windows have all obviously been drastically modernised and enlarged.


The ground-floor window furthest away from the camera may well retain an original shape though not the style. A home of older appearance resembling a Pennine farm house, nearest the viewer, offers longish low windows and an illuminated low-ceilinged attic, perhaps pressed into use for a servant's bedroom or draftsman's workshop".

No 2 - Queen Street, Hadleigh - N^{os} 1 & 2 are by the car. The Reeves lived in N^o 4 in the 1880s.

No 3 - Fenn's Georgian home, Stonestreet Farm, with illustration, showing design of a similar Georgian home built 1720. The plan also fits the Ayers Duke Street home of 1841.

Below (op cit) "The square house, like many Georgian buildings, has a symmetrical façade. The front door is usually set between two tall sash windows. Bedrooms windows are exactly above ground-floor windows. The staircase and hall are illuminated by a window above the entrance doorway".



25 08 1803 MARRIAGE at St Mary's Hadleigh, between JWA's parents, John Whislay AYERS and Ann FENN. John Whislay Ayers (snr) was probably working at the Fenn's Stonestreet Farm when he met the Yeoman's daughter! Ann was buried on 20 June 1829. Her father, Robert Fenn (died March 1838) described her in his Will as, "Ann wife of John Ayers, a Yeoman of Hadleigh." John Whisley Ayers (snr) may have died about the same time as Ann. He was not in the 1841 Census for Hadleigh, where his three daughters were living together, and financially provided for with annuities.

13 05 1804 BIRTH of the first child of Ann Fenn & John Whislay AYERS, **John Whislay AYERS-ANDREWS**(JWA) possibly at Stonestreet Farm which is close to Kersey which is the village he always claimed to have been born. 
The church was situated in Church Street, between Houghton Street (where the Ayers lived) and Bold Street (where JWA managed the Rotunda)





The following extracts from Glyn Morgan's letters show some of the arduous steps required to prove that our John Whisley Andrews was, in fact, John Whisley Ayers.

Letter dated

08 12 1983

I explained to Glyn that I had requested a ten-year search in Suffolk County for the baptism of John Whisley **Andrews** (JWA) born at Kersey, Suffolk, between February and May 1804. The search was unsuccessful and I assumed that JWA had either been baptised in another area or not baptised at all.

Letter dated 06 02 1984

The Andrews and Shaw families, I told Glyn, used significant Christian names for their children and for that reason I was surprised when JWA's death certificate gave his mother's surname as **Fenn** and not **Whisley**, however, I felt that Whisley would prove to be an ancestral surname, along with **Dalby** and **Ayers**; two names given to the youngest son of JWA.

I wrote of a hunch that JWA's father might have been involved in the hotel industry based on his Australian choice of occupations:

JWA consistently gave his place of birth as Kersey Suffolk. On one certificate his second wife, Margery, gave his birthplace as being in the adjoining County of Essex. (Did she later correspond with his relatives in Essex?)

Letter dated 15 03 1984

After three-months research, Glyn wrote, "I have had no luck yet with your Andrews' family of Suffolk from any of my London sources. I first tried the Census of 1841 to see if any **Andrews** were still around **Kersey**, but no luck. There was no one of that name in the village. If there had been, it would have been easy to spot them, for Kersey is a very small Parish consisting of little more than the village itself. In 1841 the area totalled 1630 acres, comprising 155 houses, with 387 male inhabitants and 400 females. It is a very old place which is mentioned in the Doomsday Book, but there it is spelt "Car's eye" meaning a stream running into a brook.

In regard to your suspicions that JWA's father was a Publican, there is only one pub in Kersey, the *White Horse*, but no mention of an Andrews, unfortunately. The area in that part of Suffolk was settled in the 14th Century by Flemish weavers driven out of their own country. The places around there developed, in the course of time, their own distinctive type of cloth, with Kersey becoming known for Kerseymeres, and the adjoining Lindsay for Lindsey-woolseys. All this led to the rise of many wealthy Suffolk families with plush London houses which have now given the name to many streets there, and a proliferation of country houses and mansions in Suffolk itself.

This may be why there are so many small parishes. I have never seen a county map like it. There are several hundred all told; all those villages (on the map enclosed), Lindsey, Groton, Boxford, Hadleigh, Whetfield, Semer, Chelsworth and so on in ever increasing circles, are parishes in their own right, so it is easy to see that JWA could have been christened in any one of them without great difficulty. I went through the Poll Books of Suffolk for 1830 and looked through all the names in the Hundreds of Cosford an area containing Kersey. There were not many names to look through for in those days only people of property could vote. I thought there might have been a faint change that the Andrews' family were in that class but no luck. The name Fenn appeared in other parts of the county but it would be impossible, at this stage, to link up any of those names with Ann Fenn until we know more about her especially where she came from..."

15 03 1984 ctd "The next attempt was the Boyd Marriage Index which, although it contains 7.5 million marriage entries for the parishes of England up to 1837 (the date civil registration began), had no reference to any Andrews marrying a Fenn, not in Norfolk, Suffolk or Essex, but it was interesting that the name Fenn appeared quite a great deal in Suffolk but not much in other counties.

> The other unsuccessful attempt was the IGI for the same three counties, looking for christenings of the children as well as marriages of the earlier generations. It is this problem of not knowing, positively, where to start that is so difficult.

> I expect JWA's first marriage was in England and would be after 1837, so I may do a search at St Catherine's House which is our Registry of Births, Deaths and Marriages. I will search on the basis that JWA will have entered his Christian names as "John Whisley", which is very uncommon. It is a pity that the name of his first wife was not noted on his death certificate, because that would have made the search that more positive.

> I take it that the reference to JWA or his father being a publican is supposition. Have you anything to partly confirm that, for it might be a lead. One day I hope to go to the Record Office at Ipswich and have a look around. They should have many more directories and probably Poll Books than we have in London and we can also have a blitz on the Parish Registers, so don't lose heart!"

Letter dated 26 04 1984

I forwarded Glen a copy of letters written, very capably, by JWA's second wife, Margery, together with a list of their Australian children, the last of whom was registered by Margery as John Dalby Foster Ayers Andrews. Foster/Forster was the maiden name of Margery's maternal grandmother, so I felt positive that Dalby and Ayers would also have some ancestral link to this child. Glyn replied on 26 April 1984:

"I agree with your assessment of the capabilities of JWA's wife as regards being a reliable informant on certificates. With that in mind and not looking too positively for Andrews, my eyes popped out of my head to find at Hadleigh, one of the adjoining parishes to Kersey, an entry in the IGI:

John Whislay AYERS married to Ann FENN - 25 August 1803

which absolutely fits in with the birth of your JWA some time in 1804. I just cannot wait to get up to Ipswich or Bury St Edmunds and check the original registers.

Incidentally, regarding surnames, Fenn is quite a common one around those parts. After all, we call that part of the country the Fenn District.

Whisley (Wesley, Westlay, Whistler) is very much a Suffolk or a Cambridgeshire name, and Dalby, meaning a valley farm is very rare but there are pockets of it in Suffolk and Norfolk near to Lowestoft. So the name of JWA's son by the mother in that way has interesting possibilities.

I now suspect that JWA's first marriage must have been before Civil Registrations began, so it won't be too easy to find out where it took place. Have you any idea if both he and his wife went to Australia and did she die there or was the death supposed to have taken place in this country? I do think your JWA is a traceable person for he was educated and seemingly well-off, so his name or his father's, will crop up somewhere, even if it is only to pay taxes.

It should also be possible to pick up some of the family in the 1841 Census when one gets an idea of the area in which they were living at that time. When I am next at the Census Office I will have a look at the Hadleigh Returns and see what comes up."

Letter dated 23 06 1984

I suggested to Glyn that the lack of records could have occurred because JWA's family had been Jewish. He replied: "Regarding your concern that records are missing because JWA might have been Jewish, I can state categorically that he could not have been, for the father was married in the Anglican church, and the children baptised there, and no Jew would have done that. At the time we are discussing, the Law then stated that all marriages HAD to take place at the Parish Church of one of the parties, with the exception of Jews and Quakers. For some reason they were allowed an exception and could be married under their own religious procedures, so whilst a Catholic had to accept the ministrations of a Church of England parson, the Jews did not have to knuckle under....."

23 06 1984 ctd The above photocopy of the Parish Register entry, provides signatures, for identification. By comparing the signatures of Ann Fenn and Mary Fenn, one can see a similar style and that those two girls were taught by the same teacher and, hence, likely to be sisters rather than mother and daughter. So the search must now be for an Ann Fenn of suitable age, say born about 1780 with a sister Mary Fenn. This part of the country is great for perpetuating the mother's maiden name and you can see that whilst it might have been bad enough for your famous ancestor to have carried the second name Whislay, his brother sported the name of Henry Nutton, which threw me considerably for I never thought that there could have been two (later 3) with that name. (Two were JWA's first cousins and one a brother)

> Henry Nutton Ayers (a cousin) became a successful financial adviser and I was able to follow him right up to 1861 where he had established himself at a very smart address in London, where you employ a Butler to answer the front door! He was mentioned in Pigott's Directory of 1839 as living at Boxford, and a Maltster by trade. In the 1859 Poll-book, the equivalent of the modern Register of Electors, he was living at 28 Bessborough Street, Pimlico, Middlesex, with voting rights at Hadleigh Heath by virtue of owning property there. Hadleigh Heath takes in some of the Boxford properties so I was sure that he was JWA's brother and delighted to locate him in the 1861 Census in his grand house and listed as Publisher and Financial Writer with his wife, Mary Ann (from Monks Eleigh, a few miles north of Kersey) and with daughters Geraldine 12 years and Gertrude Fanny 10 years. But his age puzzled me and with parents George and Ann, I had to accept that there were other Henry Nutton Ayers and that my aim of tracing the rest of the family through him would not work. I was all set to find out what financial papers he published, and what duff advice he might have handed out in them!

> From the Register of St Mary's Church of England, Hadleigh, I found all the children of the above marriage. Rev William Powell, the vicar of Shelley Parish, 3 miles south east of Hadleigh performed the baptisms, and not the local vicar. This would imply a very friendly relationship between Rev Powell and the Ayers, and I was intrigued to find out that instead of living in his parish, Rev Powell lived in George Street, Hadleigh, with property close to 'The Cock' licensed by John Whislay AYERS senior. 23 06 1984 ctd A Bailiff could be a court official who enforced court orders, ie entered premises and seized a debtor's goods. Another kind of bailiff in country areas, was a type of estate manager to a big landowner. I have found out about the Courts of Justice in Suffolk at that time, and a Court did sit at Hadleigh at regular intervals. A Bailiff from Colchester was attached to it, (probably travelling around regularly with the judge on his circuit) and there was a sub-bailiff, whom I would expect to be a local man and one who would only have a part-time function. This is probably the type of Bailiff John Whislay Ayers (snr) might have been. A full-time publican and a part-time Bailiff and, as there were eleven other publicans in Hadleigh at the time, it was more exclusive and dignified to put down Bailiff as one's occupation.

> An Inn Keeper. He needed to be a person of good character, or at least pretended to be, for he had to apply for permission to keep the inn open, on an annual basis. The Quarter Sessions which was one of the lower orders of Law Courts, had the administrative task, and amongst their records are the Ale Houses Recognisances which are equivalent to the annual licensing routine. I have not yet looked at this document, for Suffolk has two record offices, and whilst in the main the information is duplicated, the Quarter Sessions Records are not, hence I shall have to go to Ipswich to see about ale houses. The feature about an inn, was that they were supposed to be able to put up people, and judging from the other inns at Hadleigh, they seemed to have permanent guests of one sort or another. They were

> also expected to provide meals when wanted, so in general, inns were what became later known as

hotels."

"JWA's sister, Frances Caroline AYERS, was married at Hadleigh on 13 April 1852, to Joseph William HEARD, at the age of 32 years. One can see the matter of 'class' coming into that family's marrying customs; it was always reckoned that the middle classes waited until much later in life before the men got married, generally to allow them time to reach some sort of station in life and, as a consequence, they would pair up with much older girls, which gave them hope right up to a much older age than is usual for marriage today. So different from the labouring people where marriage, at about 21 years, was very common.

We are still left with the problem of JWA's change of name. Obviously he used AYERS whilst here and, as you said, his wife's reluctance to put his father's name on the death certificate, poses many problems, as if she were aware he has assumed an alias, otherwise one would have expected for her to say the father's name was '---- ANDREWS', but she didn't offer a Christian or a Surname.

Letter dated 04 01 1985

Jane AYERS m. 1838 George Reeve and Frances Caroline AYERS m. 1852 Joseph William Heard "In a way I feel quite sad about the whole family (of JWA and his 8 siblings), in that fate seems to have dealt them some bad blows. The only two that had any children were JWA and Frances Caroline Ayers-Heard. Although Jane married, she did not have any children of her own, and there is no record so far of what happened to Emily Edwards Ayers since the 1861 Census. I checked marriage and death indexes for 10 years from that date and also the Will Index, but so sign of Emily to 1880. I wonder if that horrible reference in the 1861 Census to her being deaf, had anything to do with her disappearance. Would she have gone to some form of Institution?

John Whislay AYERS senior, should have left a Will for his daughters to have been provided for financially as they were. [unless JWA sent money back from Australia]. The Church Courts handled such matters, but when land was involved it would be difficult to know which Court handled the probate matters - it depended in which Diocese the property lay. The case of him owning land is not a great consideration, so I am hoping that anything they owned would be cleared by the Consistory Court of either the Bishop of Suffolk at Ipswich, or by the Archdeacon at Sudbury and, if so, Suffolk Record Office should have some idea where a Will might be found.

You will see from the census returns enclosed (See Census section), that there was a double Ayers marriage into the Heard family, and there were five children from each marriage. One child from the second marriage was given the middle name of 'Whisley', so it certainly meant something in that family.

It is interesting that on the marriage entry, Frances Caroline Ayers gave her father's occupation as 'Inn Keeper' and a further connection with the brewery trade came with the marriage of Frances' oldest daughter Jane Harriet Heard, June quarter 1876, to Frederick Hogg of Hadleigh. They kept the 'Shoulder of Mutton' pub in Bridge Street, Hadleigh."

John Whislay Ayers, snr, was Landlord of *The Cock* from c1815 - 1824. Old Directories show only this one Public House in George St. Rev William Powell, Vicar of Shelly (6km s. Hadleigh), an apparent close friend who baptised some of the Ayers children, owned property and lived almost next to *The Cock*.

The Cock is a framed building over 400 years old. There was a phase when it was considered old fashioned to be living in a framed building, so all sorts of subterfuges were devised to conceal the beams. The landlord of Kersey Pub (Photo 4) said his pub was built in 1435. The foundations were just heavy oak baulks laid horizontally along the ground, upon which the structure was erected. In spite of the distorted shape he assured us that there was not much movement in the buildings now, and that he had very little maintenance.

I was told that in the days those buildings were erected, the tools available were not hard enough to keep their sharpness when used with fully seasoned English oak, so there was a tendency to shape the wood whilst it was partially unseasoned, with the result that the finished structure would twist somewhat. and...... Photo No 2 which I took along George St, brings that out, although you might be inclined to think that since the elevations are plastered, that the building is not timber. We looked around Lavenham and Kersey where the timber framed buildings are such a delight to behold, especially as people are now carefully restoring them". Glyn 1986










"To reconcile JWA's birthplace as Kersey, we need to look at a map of the area showing the proximity of *Stonestreet Farm* to Kersey, as opposed to Hadleigh, where he was baptised.

The 300-acre farm belonged to the Fenn family for over 100 years, and was occupied by JWA's grandparents at the time of his birth."

04 01 1985 ctd The Census documents provide a good idea of the social background of the families. The Fenns were the most highly placed, with their fairly large farm (Stonestreet farm near Kersey), but the others took up trades in which one was one's own master and owned or ran a business. The Reeve's family were typical of this. They were a well established Hadleigh family with roots going back to sometime in the 1600s. At the time of the census returns there were four brothers around the area, all having businesses associated with building or the furnishing of houses. One was a master carpenter, another an upholsterer and Jane Ayers husband, George Reeve, was a plumber and glazier. John Bendall and Charlotte Reeve were cabinet makers.

> They spent their last days being looked after by Frances Caroline Ayers' daughter, Jane Harriet Hogg (nee Heard) at the Shoulder of Mutton."

Page 10 ... (Ayers-Andrews Name Change)

After a great deal of perseverance Glyn found the marriage of **John Whisley ANDREWS** in Aberford Yorkshire - a long way from Suffolk. He was married on 11 April 1837 to *Priscilla MORRIS* who was born on 24 November 1810 and baptised 17 January 1811 at Aberford Yorkshire, the daughter of Mary and Edward Morris, Inn Keeper. There is no explanation as to why he was so far from home, except for the inn-keeping connection.

In the same year John Whisley ANDREWS was listed in the Liverpool Directory (west coast of England) as living at 12 Benson Street, a Master of the Rotunda; a building with gymnasium and billiard facilities.

Letter dated 22 02 1985

"There has been one little hiccough so far. Up to now everything has fitted exactly with known information, even the Rotunda at Liverpool with its billiards association and JWA's Australian occupation of billiard maker. Also, on the marriage certificate of his daughter, ¹Emily Morris Ayers, in London, she gave her father's occupation as 'Licensed Victualler' rather than the English version of 'Publican' or 'Inn-keeper', so I thought that proved quite a great deal of communication between father and daughter.

But to get back to the one difficulty, there were FOUR daughters and one son (against 'TWO daughters and 1 son living' as per JWA's death certificate). At first I thought that Mary Ann had died very young, for her name does not appear on the IGI, whereas the others do, and since there was a death of a Mary Ann Ayers registered a few months afterwards in the Cosford or Hadleigh area, I bought the certificate. However, it turned out that George Henry Nutton Ayers had a daughter also called Mary Ann!

Assuming that the information presented by Margery Shaw-Andrews on her husband's death certificate is correct and I am pretty sure that there were enough letters plying back and fore, for her to be really au fait with news of the family back in Suffolk, then two daughters died before 1870. It is possible that ²Mary Ayers baptised August 1839, is the same person who appears in St Catherine's Death Index, as having died in the Liverpool district, March quarter 1840. [This proved to be correct, and ⁵Ann died pre 1860]. So the ⁴AYERS, Mary aged 8, living with her aunt Jane in 1851 is the ⁴AYERS, Mary Ann 'Frances' Ayers whose birth certificate we have.

JWA sent ¹Emily Morris Ayers and ⁴AYERS, Mary Ann 'Frances' Ayers to Hadleigh to live with his sisters when he sailed to Australia. He probably took his only other surviving child, ³Robert, to an unmarried First cousin, Elizabeth Fenn (1817-1882). In her Will, Elizabeth bequeathed a chest of drawers to Robert showing a fondness for such a distant relative.

"The problem of communication between the Hadleigh folk and your ancestor at Sydney, still continues to puzzle me. I expect the Hadleigh folk would have posted their letters when they went to Ipswich, for by this time there was a railway from Hadleigh to Ipswich, but I just cannot think what could have been arranged as far as the incoming mail was concerned. Letters were few in those days, and there would have been the same staff working on the mail from one year to the next, so the arrival of a letter from abroad with a strange stamp would be an event, and news about it would soon circulate in the district. And it would be no use sending the letters to a friend in an adjacent village because it would only start gossip there. So the only option would be to send the letters, in the first instance, to someone away from Hadleigh (Essex?) and for that person to enclose the message in another envelope with a British stamp on it and an unrecognisable handwriting for the address.... continued

..... You mentioned that JWA might have made a financial settlement on his first Australian-born child, Eleanor Jane Andrews-Layton, and if so, it would indicate that he might have been afraid of being traced. I am still mystified as to what happened to John Whislay Ayers, Snr. It is a bit of, like father like son, for one would think that with being a Bailiff and an Inn Keeper, as well as being able to leave two daughters well off, that at least a few traces of him would remain, if only a Will, but I have found nothing."

LETTER TO GLYN REGARDING A VISIT TO AUSTRALIA BY JWA'S ENGLISH CHILDREN

Three years and 7 months after the last major discovery, I found that two of JWA's English children had visited Australia, and the following letter was written, in haste, to Glyn and Pam Morgan!

Letter dated May 1989

"You will have to bear with me with - the wait will be worth it! At the time of the 1851 Census, you found that the family of JWA had left Houghton Street, Liverpool, and two daughters (¹Emily Morris and ⁴Mary Ann) were back in High Street, Hadleigh, with three sisters of their father, JWA. You asked, 'But where were Priscilla, son ³Robert and daughter ⁵Ann?' You believed that Priscilla had remained in England and not died between 1846 and 1858.

At the time of the 1851 Census, ¹Emily Morris and ⁴Mary Ann Ayers were living with their aunts, but when the 1861 Census was taken, only Emily Morris Ayers remained - and went on to marry Joseph William Heard in 1871. You then puzzled over the question of where did people like Margery Shaw, Jane Reeve, Caroline Heard and ¹Emily Morris Ayers, fit into all this. You assumed, 'They just must have known and helped with the conspiracy. Surely JWA in Australia, writing to his sisters or his children, would have used their name 'Ayers' on the envelope which Margery would have seen and, in turn, all of them writing to him would have been careful to use 'Andrews' in the address'.

<u>NOW</u>. I spent today with Nola Mackey as she moves out of Grafton next weekend. Recently the Immigration Deposits Journal Index was made available and the microfiche purchased by Nola. I didn't know it existed until today.

I searched for **John Whisley ANDREWS** in case he'd been sponsored by a relative already living in Australia. Next try was for John Whisley AYERS or AYERS - again without success. However, the name 'Margery Shaw' caught my eye as the sponsor of three Ayers' children. The year was 1860 so my curiosity dropped. Margery **SHAW** married JWA in 1858, so that by 1860 she was, in fact, Margery **ANDREWS**. Before 1858 Margery had been the widow of John Smith PAPPS, and had not been known as **Margery SHAW** for seven years. However, the names of the Ayers' children she sponsored were so very familiar:

From notes I had taken to Nola's home, I was able to calculate that in 1860, ¹Emily should have been 22, ³AYERS, Robert 20 and ⁴Frances (obviously Mary Ann) 17. It was apparent from the ages, that the initial applications had been made two years earlier (1858) upon the marriage of their father (JWA) to Margery Shaw-Papps. I instantly recalled how you theorised, 'once JWA had settled somewhere, he would have wanted to be reunited with his children and might have sent for them to join him in Australia.' At this point I was almost speechless with excitement (mentally writing this letter to you). However, I kept worrying over the fact that both ¹Emily and ³Robert had made lives for themselves back in England - Emily had married at Hadleigh in 1871, and Robert had died in Cambridgeshire in 1918. Nola had the Shipping list for the 'Lady McDonald' on which the children sailed. Another surprise, ¹Emily was missing from the records:

I could not get home fast enough to write to you with this news. You reasoned that, at the time ¹ Emily married and gave her father's occupation as Licensed Victualler (as opposed to Publican) she must have known her father's story. And, you kept saying, 'Margery <u>must</u> have known'. Now we have proven conclusively that she DID know and aided in bringing the children to Australia, even getting herself very deeply involved by reverting to her maiden name (by-passing the name Papps from a previous marriage).

GLYN'S REPLY REGARDING A VISIT TO AUSTRALIA BY JWA'S ENGLISH CHILDREN

02 06 1989

"I am simply bursting with excitement at your latest find regarding the children of JWA, so although Pam and I are going on holiday tomorrow, I wanted to get this short interim reply off to you before the news goes cold. I also wanted to throw a few ideas into the melting pot.

Firstly, ³Robert Edward AYERS was mentioned in Elizabeth Fenn's Will, June 1883, as the recipient of an oak chest which, as I remarked at the time, was an indication that he lived around Hadleigh district. Moreover, Elizabeth Fenn only made her Will a short time before her death, so the oak chest to Robert could not have been something thought up before 1860 (Australian voyage) and such a bequest would not have gone to someone the other side of the world. Hence the Will and death of Robert Edward Ayers at Cambridge in 1918, still stand. Secondly, it looks as if Robert's trade was affected by the Hadleigh Reeve's family who were looking after ¹Emily and ⁴Frances back in 1851.

This conjured up the idea that **ALL** the surviving Ayers children went with their father back to his home territory, with perhaps the exception of ⁵Ann born 15 January 1846, who may have remained with her mother or had already died in the first weeks of infancy. Then there was ¹Emily Morris Ayers who, after 13 years, appeared to have settled at Hadleigh, for she was at the Reeves home both in 1851 and 1861, and eventually married in 1871.

JWA wanted to have all his children near him, but ¹Emily's last-minute refusal may have been caused by her attachment to her guardian aunt of all those years. Aunt Jane Ayers-Reeve died in August 1871, and may have had declining health for some years. Also, in the previous November, Emily lost her other aunt, Frances Caroline. When Emily declined the voyage to Australia in 1860, she would never have believed that within 11 years she would marry Joseph William Heard, the widower of her aunt Frances.


However, ³Robert and ⁴'Frances' went to Australia, but it would seem that Robert, and possibly 'Frances', were unable to settle. Regarding the change of name of Mary, she would have been in daily contact with Frances Caroline Ayers, JWA's sister, and it could be that she adopted her name especially as both the original Mary and possibly Ann had died. There are many examples, at the time, of people being called something completely different to their baptismal names.

I think it is time to rehabilitate JWA to the company of decent people; he has taken too much stick from all of us. I have felt for a long time that, with the case of five servants at Liverpool in the 1841 Census, Priscilla Morris had delusions of grandeur, and it could be that JWA just could not keep up with her financially. It could be that SHE left him, for you will recall that I failed to find a trace of her in the 1851 Census amongst her kith and kin in Yorkshire which was where I would have expected her to go if she had been a jilted wife. So did Priscilla leave JWA stranded? This would have compelled him to take the children back to Hadleigh, and then gambled on emigration to Australia with the idea of being reunited with the children as soon as possible. If so, then he may have sailed to Australia as AYERS and may have taken on ANDREWS in Australia.

I just cannot see how the plot would have worked out if there had not been a great deal of sympathy* between all the family at Hadleigh and him in Sydney, and perhaps the reason Margery SHAW was the sponsor rather than the father, was to avoid perjuring himself on an official document, a copy of which would be transmitted to Britain. To be on the safe side, as far as England was concerned, he would have to have given his name as **John Whisley AYERS**, and then what would the Australian authorities have thought? One thing is obvious - we shall still have plenty to talk about when we meet next March in Grafton. Glyn & Pam"







FOR REMARRIAGE, it seems that Margery needed one clear year after her husband was lost at sea. JWA could have used an English Law enabling him to marry after a conditional seven-year separation (by water). If he were a widower, then his first wife (who definitely did not die in England) may have migrated to some other country. According to Glyn, they certainly were not divorced.

Glyn wrote in 1985, "..... There was no way that one could have been obtained a Divorce. Prior to 1858, the very rich and influential could get a divorce by arranging for a special Bill through Parliament, to dissolve the marriage, but for other people there was nothing until the Matrimonial Measures Act of 1857 authorised the setting up of the necessary Law Courts, and the records of that Act did not commence until the beginning of 1858. So JWA would only have had about six weeks between the possibility of a divorce and his second marriage.

[To dispel unlawful actions on the part of JWA] I went through all the court cases at Liverpool, and at Manchester, to be sure, from June 1846, before the latest child Ann Ayers was baptised, to the end of 1848, and there was no mention of JWA, so his hurried and secretive departure from England was for some other reason. I did have a moment that was bad for my heart, for there was an entry at Liverpool for a John Ayers with a sentence of 7 years transportation, but on further study of the case and of the prisoner's age, it showed that it was a different person altogether. That one was only 20 years old and he was quite a bad lad with a record of previous convictions.

If JWA had walked out on his family, it is unlikely he would have taken a ship from Liverpool, for they wouldn't leave port in those days, with the precision they do today, so it would have been harder to plan his moves. I wonder if he took his children to his sisters in Hadleigh, before himself setting sail for distant lands. The snag with that theory is that once he had settled somewhere he would have wanted to be reunited with his children, and might have sent for them to join him in Australia. [Glyn's theory proved to be absolutely correct]

I keep feeling that JWA's marriage was a rocky one, and that he may have been forced to lead a life-style greater than he could afford. One servant seemed to have been the norm, even for the Heards, with what I would have thought a slightly better social position, yet JWA had five people waiting on him, and even allowing for the paltry wages paid in those days, he would still have had to receive a good income to be able to house all those people. My first thoughts were that No 9 Houghton Street was a sort of hotel, but from both the 1841 and 1851 Census returns there is no evidence other than that it was a private house. So there was a question of the 5 servants being a matter of appearance, rather than necessity, and then putting down 'gentleman' on all the birth certificates and on the baptismal registers when he was just holding down a salaried position - so it leaves me wondering if Priscilla Morris-Ayers had a lot of airs and graces and that JWA did the only thing possible in those days - he disappeared! And in his disappearance, he had to cover his tracks well, and probably deployed a tortuous route to throw off all traces of a scent, and that is why you are having such difficulty finding a ship for him.... I get consolation from the family tree you sent me which sets out all the Andrews children in Australia with so many being given names the same as those of his sisters back at Hadleigh, and with the last son being named by Margery, as John Dalby Foster Ayers ANDREWS - Glyn".

PLYMOUTH TO SYDNEY - Two of the three English children of **John Whisley ANDREWS**, sailed from Plymouth on the "Lady McDonald", arriving on this day. An application for their voyage was lodged in 1858, just after Margery and John Whisley Andrews were married. This was the first chance to reunite the Ayers children with their father since approximately 1846. The intentions of all parties were clearly honourable as the Minister of their Church was involved in providing references. This was the Parish Church of generations of the Ayers family and where the children and their Ayers aunts still worshipped

It is obvious from the Depositors' Index that Margery knew about her husband's earlier life, his name-change and the need for secrecy. She became a party to the fact when she undertook to act as Depositor for his children to visit Australia, by using her maiden name **Margery SHAW**; a name that she had not used since before her first marriage to John Smith PAPPS, in 1853!

The entries from the Depositors' Index No. 3086 - Reel 2670 Deposit No 4140 - Reference O/ENG/R 1245 1/8/1861 may have meant a return journey to England on 1/8/1861. Robert AYERS died in London, unmarried, on 2/2/1918, aged 77 years. No trace has yet been found of Mary Ann 'Frances' AYERS in Australia or England. She lived beyond May 1870 – beyond the age of 27 years.

¹Emily Morris AYERS did not visit Australia. In 1870 Emily's aunt, Frances Caroline AYERS-HEARD, died. On 4/12/1871 the widower, Joseph William HEARD, married Emily Morris AYERS in London. In 1881 they lived in George Street, Hadleigh, but within four years the family moved to Kent from where Joseph died, in his home County, during May 1885.

- O1 08 1861 POSSIBLE RETURN VOYAGE of ³Robert Edward AYERS and his sister. The unusual reference listed in the Depositor's Journal reads "O/ENG/R 1245. 1/8/1861" and may allude to a return ticket. We know Robert returned.
- 15 05 1862 BIRTH of JWA's son ⁸John Shaw ANDREWS, at Liverpool Sydney. This child died aged 28 months from scarlatina shortly before his aunt contracted and died from the same infectious disease.



The Andrews lived here from late 1862 to late 1865.

3 - MACQUARIE PLACE SKETCH

"The hub of Old Sydney was Macquarie Place, adjacent to the Government Wharf at the head of Sydney Cove. (See triangular outline)

Macquarie Place is no longer on the waterfront, which was pushed back by the reclamation of the foreshores to form 'Semicircular Quay' in the 1840s and 1850s.

Prominent in Macquarie Place stands the obelisk inscribed, 'this obelisk was erected in Macquarie Place AD 1818 to record that all the public roads leading to the interior of the colony are measured from it. L Macquarie, Esq, Governor.'

Also in Macquarie Place, mounted on a pediment is the anchor of HMS Sirius, the escorting Warship of the First Fleet, under Captain Phillip, which anchored in Sydney Cove 26/1/1788. While landing cargo in 1790 at Norfolk Island she was wrecked. A century later her rusty anchor was salvaged and eventually erected in Macquarie Place. Near it is mounted an old muzzle-loading cannon, date-stamped 1788 believed to be off the Sirius.

When Governor Macquarie cleared Macquarie Place of buildings he gave focus to the rambling rutty roads that wound round about, but this district, sharing with The Rocks and Lower George Street, the distinction of being the oldest civilised part of Australia.

The first Bank of New South Wales was established in Mary Reiby's Cottage, No. 6 Macquarie Place, and opened in 1817."





Almost immediately, the family left the premises and soon moved out of the hotel industry altogether. Aunt Eliza might have been a live-in Nanny for her nephew.



At Paddington in 1878, 'Carrie' married Robert Dunbar ROGERS, son of John 'George' and Maria. He was a Wahroonga Caterer, formerly of La Perouse. He and 'Carrie' were interred in the Rookwood Anglican Cemetery. Despite a Depression between the death of Robert on 3 November 1930, and her own in death in 1940, Carrie increased the family wealth from £4,596 to £7,624.

DEATH in Sydney of JWA's youngest child, the last in the family to die, ¹⁰John Dalby Foster Ayres ANDREWS aged 80 years. He was cremated at the Eastern Suburbs Crematorium, and his Probate, dated June 1958 was valued at £1,936.6.0 nett.

John Dalby Foster Ayres Andrews was born on 20 February 1868, at Hill Street, Sydney, at a time when his family was residing in Campbell Street, Sydney. The informant of his birth was his mother, Margery nee Shaw, and the person responsible for naming him the way she did. While no solution has been found for "Dalby" it was found that "Foster/Forster" was a family name on the maternal Shaw side. The fourth given name of "AYRES" turned out to be the family name of his father.

On 21 February 1887, ¹⁰John ANDREWS" was married at St Mathias, Paddington. His bride was Elizabeth Sarah BENNETT who was born in 1867 the daughter of Enoch Bennett and Anna Montgomery. Witnesses were the groom's sister, Caroline Elizabeth Andrews-Rogers and her husband Robert Dunbar Rogers.


