Van der Zee

Jacobus son of Cornelis and Cornelia
 his wife was baptized at the Austin
 Friars Dulich Church London
 1 August 1688.

B.
 Balté Van der Zee brought letters of
 attestation signed by David Clingant,
 Preacher at Delft, in the name of the
 Consistory, and dated at Delft
 19 July 1674. He was in that year
 received as a member of this Church

It would seem from the above that Wavy⁵
 must have misread the inscription which was
 evidently much worn & even at that date, the
 age of Jacobus Van der Zee being 58 was 32
 at the time of his death.

King Charles II by order in Council of 21 July
 1681 promised to grant free letters of designation
 under the great seal to all Protestants "who shall
 come hither for refuge and reside here". Many of
 the French Protestants at this time seeing what
 was likely to happen began to migrate in large
 numbers to England. The Dutch congregation
 took advantage of all privileges granted to
 Refugees from France. The Revocation of the Edict
 of Nantes in 1685 drove over 50,000 of the most
 useful and industrious inhabitants of France
 to England.
 Whilst during the reigns of Char II & James II
 the Dutch congregation in England decreased
 in number the quiet times in the Netherlands

inviting them to return there; yet the coming to England of William Prince of Orange was hailed with joy by the Netherland Refugees, and their numbers were greatly augmented by the host of Dutchmen of all conditions who came with him or followed his footsteps. Their advancement to the state gave great offence to the English.

It has been suggested that the Vander Zees originally settled at Rockfort in Essex -
 Examina Register which dates from 1678.
 A son of James Vanderzee of Billerica settled there later on as a Solicitor.

The signature is not like that employed by Mr
Van der Zee later on. a copy?

Apparently some of the Paris family were
still in business as attorneys for Maryland for
some years longer.

Thomas Paris (the last of this name) died soon
after 1735 vide

Did Mr Vanderzee before he sailed altogether
as Maryland practitioner in London partly?

In some articles of indenture betw: Mr Vanderzee
and William Boys of Colchester dated July

1739
~~1739~~ a sentence to the following effect: is 9
inserted .. the said Jaes Van derzee shall
and will allow provide and find sufficient meat
drink washing and lodging for the said William
Boys the younger during the said term when and
so long as he shall reside and be with the said
Jaes Van derzee in the country and also
shall and will allow and pay unto the said
William Boys the younger seven shillings
weekly and every week in lieu of meat
drink & washing and fire and provide for
him convenient lodging when he shall
reside with the said Jaes Van derzee
in London during the said term of five
years"

In this indenture Mr Vanderzee is described
as one of the attorneys of His Majesty's Court of
Common Pleas at Westminster

Mr Jacobus Vanderzee apparently resided
in Newland sometime before he was admitted as an
Attorney for he married Mary the dau: of Henry Gusterson
of Newland before 1736. as his eldest child Esther, the
m^r Simon Cooper, was born in that year. His children were
Esther 1736. James 1737. John 1738. Mary 1740
Thomas 1744. Elizabeth 1745. Henry 1747 (posthumous)

It would appear that at this time Attorneys
were admitted as Attorneys in Common Law
and Chancery at different times - hence
^{possibly} probably Mr Vanderzee had been admitted
as an Attorney in the Court of Common Pleas
some years before he was admitted on the
Chancery side.

His m^r in law, successor in Newland Mr
Samuel Alster was admitted as an Attorney
in the Court of Common Pleas on 26th of June
1746. and later on viz on 20th May 1760.

before Sir Thomas Mordaunt (!) he was admitted and
enrolled as a Solicitor of the Court of Chancery.

April 26. 1734. The answer of Edward Moor one of the Defendants
to a bill of complaint of Mary Warner & others -
was taken in Newland 26 April 1734 by Thos Paris
for Vanderzee.

Did Mr Vanderzee carry on his business partly in London
with pay?

in Mr Samuel Alster's notebook 1745-46

he notes having to meet Mr Vanderzee & write to him
on certain dates - as if he was away from Newland.

A letter is addressed to Mr V. on Aug 25. 1739
For

The House at Mayland (Alston Court)

Formerly known as 'Groom'.

Built in different periods: the recent portion being the present kitchen and room over it 15th century work (?) the carving on the rafters is deep and bold, and in good preservation. The 'kitchen' is all paneled except a small portion of the wall behind the door where some old ^{printed cloth} tapestry hangs, an examination of the work of the panels suggests that this is later work, and a date of 1630 on the top of one of the splinters near the side of the window on the west side confirms the view that originally the room was hung with ^{printed cloth} tapestry, & that as that date this was replaced by panel work. The tracery of the windows on both sides is 15th cent. work. The room was originally lighted by a long window on the East side - a central

window on the west - with wing at each end corresponding to the long light on the East side - the door leading into the hall is a 15th cent. doorway, shown by character of the spandrels.

There is a little wooden figure in a niche on the East wall - in a military habit holding a halbert in his hand - curly hair or wig projects from under it, the figure has a codpiece & very broad toes to his shoes. remains of red coloring on his clothes - the sleeves are large and hanging. The figure suggests one of the Flemish band who landed at Ravenspurgh with Edward 1471.

Sleeve of doublet 4½ inches
Top of shoes 1½ inches broad
Halbert. 17½ inches

The new fashion which Edw is chose for
 his last state dress was to have them made
 with very full hanging sleeves like a monk's.
 The men wore shoes with a point before half a
 foot long, eminent persons a foot long, and
 Princes two feet long. Afterward assuming a
 contrary fashion they wore slippers so very
 broad in front as to exceed the measure
 of a good foot.

Sarah wife of Rev John White of Weyland
and Susan the wife of Rev^d Reynolds"
M^{rs} Jane Paris appears to have sold some of
the property - one portion a messuage with
meadow
orchard & p^{er}sonery, ground and premises in
the occupation of the Navigators of the "Plover Stower"
& the other a messuage with its appur^{tenances} called the

King's Head ^{which was in the occupation of}
 the Gosnall ^{3rd son of Peter} - being also in a ruinous state
 of repair - an agreement was afterwards
 come to between the parties - the sisters taking the
 property & allowing Mr. James P. £11 a year an annuity.
 M^{rs} Jane Paris had before this left Maryland
 & was living at Chelmsworth in Suffolk.

Thomas Paris the younger was son of Thomas
 Paris an attorney at Maryland who died 1728
 and grandson of Thomas Paris (sic) a
 clothier in Maryland.

Thomas Paris the elder married somewhere
 about 1696 Sarah Neve a daughter of
 William Neve of Ipswich (or Nevers).
 She predeceased her husband.

Thomas Paris the younger died 1735. leaving
 his two sisters Sarah wife of Rev John White
 of Maryland & Susan Reynolds his heir
 at law.

1st April 1778 James Stow papered best chamber closet & above the wainscot in the hall - whilst Geo Barker & others worked all day casing ceiling in hall with fine mastic

4th March 1778 "Edwards & Gutterton had six large waggon loads of rubbish arising from alterations made in hall and parlour etc"

1st April the parlour was floored

13 April. Wm Bartholomew & his men fixed chimney piece in fore parlour.

In May 1778 Wm Seabrook worked for 6 days laying down the hall floor - 2nd May the hall windows were puttied & painted - & the same treatment was applied to the wainscot.

16th June 1778 Capt. Adm^l Beale (Grand Eq. the Rev. Dr Jones) took on the Trinity

25 Aug 1778 Thos Shop & Robt Pannell worked till 4 o'clock in tarring the stable & granary

17th 18th. In July & August. Wm Seabrook - carpenter of Stoke floored the 'Oratory' over the 'Refectory' & worked on the windows - fixed cupboards & fixed small grate - filling up fireplace.

In 1904. I noticed a writing on one of these boards the cupboard was removed - "Wm Seabrook made this 1706" E.L.F.
