and preserve them by mats. Also, in
hot-beds, cucumbers, melons, small
salading, early and red cabbage, kid-
ney beans, and cauliflowers. Plant
cabbages, horse-radish, beans, &c.

Sow principal crops of carrots, early turnips, radishes, onions, cabbage, celery, cauliflower, spinach, lettuce, asparagus, peas and beans. Sow asparagus for the new plantations of the next year. Graft apples, pears, cherries, plums, &c. Prune shrubs, vines, evergreens, &c.

Sow and plant, as in former month, for the latter crop. Towards the middle of the month, dung should be prepared for ridges of melons and cucumbers. Snails and slugs ought to be killed, and weeds kept down; otherwise they will increase so as to render their destruction difficult.

Sow savoys, broccoli, borecole, cabbage, turnips, carrots, spinach, coleworts, kidney beans, lettuce, endive, celery, cucumbers, radishes, peas, beans, and small saladings. Particular attention is now required to weeding, hoeing, thinning, watering, and transplanting for autumn, &c.

Prepare ground for the reception of succession crops, some main crops for autumn and winter, and sow turnips, &c. The radishes sown now will be fit towards September, and cauliflowers sown in May must be planted out in spots where they are to remain.

Asparagus beds planted in March must be cleared; celery transplanted and earthed, and the heads or suckers taken from the March artichokes. The early cabbage seed must not be sown later than the twelfth of this month; but lettuce seed may be put in as late as the twenty-fourth.

Sow spinach, lettuce, onions, radishes, cabbage, colewort, shewil-corn, salad, borage, coriander, turnips, and succession of small salad-ing. Plant savoy, cabbages, cole-worts, broccoli, borecole, lettuce, leeks, celery, endive, and perennial, aromatic, and pot herbs.

Sow a small crop of radishes and lettuce, succession of small salad-ing. Plant crops of cabbages, cauliflowers, broccoli, lettuce, early beans. Uncover, for the greater part of this month, such cauliflowers as are planted in frames. Spare ground should be dunged and trenched.

Most of the processes used last month will also be appropriate for this: such as giving air to lettuce and cauliflower plants that are under frames. Cut down the leaves of artichokes, and earth up the plants. Transplant fruit trees; put bulbous roots into the ground; prune, &c.

Forward the digging and manuring, or trenching vacant ground, preparing hot dung, making up beds, and earthing and tying up plants. Sow early peas and radishes on warm borders, and cucumbers on hot-beds. Plant early beans, cabbage plants, and in hot-beds mint and asparagus.

Rates and Fares of Hackney Coaches,

For any distance not exceeding 1 mile, 1s.; and for any distance exceeding 1 mile, after the rate of 6d. for every half mile, or any fractional part of half a mile.

Fares by Time.—For any time not exceeding 30 minutes, 1s.; above 30 minutes, and not exceeding 45, 1s. 6d.; above 45 minutes, and not exceeding 1 hour, 2s.; and for any time exceeding 1 hour, at the rate of 6d. every 15 minutes, or part of 15 mins.

The driver has the option to charge by distance or time.

Cabriolet Fares are one-third less than the above.

The Act describes a circuit of three miles from the General Post Office, as the limit of the metropolis, within which distance no back-carriage is to be charged. For any fare set down beyond such limit, after eight in the evening until five in the morning, the driver is entitled to the full fare from the place of such discharge to the nearest point of such limit, or to any standing of hackney carriages where such coach may have been hired beyond such limit, at the option of the person discharging the same; and in case any hackney carriage shall be hired and driven into the country in the day-time, and there discharged, at a distance of four miles or more beyond the said limits of the metropolis, the driver is entitled to the full fare back to such limit, or to any standing of hackney coaches where such coach may have been hired, at the option of the person discharging the same.

No coachman is compelled to drive more than five miles from General Post Office, or the stand where he may be engaged.

Hackney carriages to have numbered plates conspicuously placed; penalty for concealing, or preventing inspection of them, 5*l*.

If any property is left in any hackney carriage, the driver is required to carry the same to the Stamp Office, Somerset House, and there deposit it, under a penalty of 20*l*. The owner may demand the same any time within a year, paying all expenses incurred, together with any reasonable sum (in reference to value of the property) to the driver, that Commissioners may award.

Porterage.

For any parcel not weighing more than 56lb. and when the distance does not exceed a quarter of a mile, 3*d*.; half a mile, 4*d*.; a mile, 6*d*.; a mile and a half, 8*d*.; two miles, 10*d*.; and 3*d*. for every additional half-mile. Porters exacting more to be fined 20*s*. or not less than 5*s*.; misbehaving, 20*s*. to 10*l*s.

A ticket to be sent with every parcel, with the charge for carriage and porterage marked on it, under a penalty of 40*s*. or not less than 5*s*. Parcels are to be delivered at any place within half a mile of the carriage pavement in six hours after arrival, under

a penalty of 20*s*. or not less than 10*s*. Parcels arriving between four in the evening and seven in the morning, to be delivered in six hours from the latter period, under the like penalty.

By 1 William IV. cap. 68, it is enacted that mail contractors, coach proprietors, and carriers shall not be liable for the loss of any parcel containing coin, gold or silver manufactured or unmanufactured, jewellery, watches, clocks, &c.; bills, bank notes or securities for the payment of money, maps, writings, title-deeds, paintings, plated articles, glass, china, manufactured or unmanufactured silks, furs, or lace, where the value of such parcel exceeds 10*l*., unless delivered as such, and an increased charge be paid and accepted for the same, of which charge notice is to be affixed in offices and warehouses. Nothing in this act annuls, or in any wise affects any special contract for the conveyance of goods. Nor does it protect from liability for loss or injury to goods from the felonious acts of any coachman, guard, book-keeper, or other servant; or for any loss or injury occasioned by neglect or misconduct.

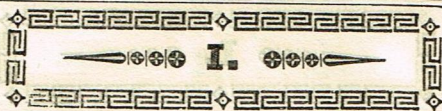

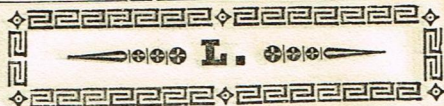
